Your new Iams brush

Daily brushing is recommended for your cat. Your special lams brush helps with grooming by removing extra fur, and keeping the coat well oiled.

With regular massage sessions:

- Cats often become more affectionate and attentive to you.
- Massage can improve sociability. She'll love the new ways you touch her!
- Kassage can alert you to any physical changes in your cat's health.

Your special relationship will also improve as the suggested massage techniques in this booklet will create an even stronger bond between you.

Gliding back loops

Area: Back Motion: Gliding Speeds: Slow, moderate Pressures: Light, mild, deep

**Technique:** Now we use two hands – one with palms, one with your brush. Gently glide your palm down your cat's back. When that palm is halfway down, glide with your other hand, using the brush.

As your palm reaches her tail, glide it off, and continue again at the top. Repeat with your 'brush-hand' to create a wide continuous loop.

Some strokes can be one long glide, or three shorter glides or even six very short glides. Start slowly. Let the brush flow all along the back. Find a comfortable rhythm for you and your cat to enjoy. Experiment with all pressures. If you rub deeper, rub slower. Extra cat fur may appear on your brush. This is good for your cat as it helps with her grooming.



Chin to chest caress

Areas: Chin and chest Motion: Rubbing Speeds: Slow, moderate Pressures: Light, mild

**Technique:** Hold your special lams brush under your cat's chin. Let her rest her head on it for a moment – allow her to sniff it and feel its bumpy texture.

With a light pressure – remember the windpipe is here – slowly pull the brush out to the tip of the chin. Then pull it back down along the chin, to her chest. Slowly repeat up and down.

After a few long strokes, caress just her chin area; next caress just the chest.

Always start slowly – take two full seconds to go up and down. When comfortable with your brush, massage with shorter rubs.

Start with light pressure; vary with mild.

GLD

Your cat will often show enjoyment – tilt her head up, chin pointing toward the sky. When she does, you can even support her head with your other hand.



Cheek rubs

Area: Cheeks Motions: Circling, rubbing Speed: Slow Pressures: Light, mild

Technique: Tenderly caress small circles around your cat's cheek.

Repeat with counter clockwise circles. Next, rub back and forth.

Go very slowly; feel the bony contours of the cheek. Count two full seconds to make a single large circle – that's very slow and that's what your cat likes.

Or make your circles very tiny; barely move your brush. Then make them bigger, like the size of your finger pad. Use a light pressure.

Caution: Be careful not to bend her whiskers backward or forward.





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
